Photos—Margaret Gilchrist **JACOB RUMBIAK** was born in Yabon in the highland district of Ayamaru in Dutch New Guinea. His parents are from BIAK-NUMFOOR Island on the north coast. Both were primary school teachers, his father also a Protestant pastor. His mother died during childbirth in 1982 while he was studying in West Java.

After the Indonesian occupation, Daniel Rumbiak moved his family from the village to the jungle with the freedom fighters, where Jacob, then about ten, was taught to hunt and harvest and feed the families. When conditions worsened after the Act of Free Choice in 1969, he led a platoon, of thirty-seven men, in the CASSOWARY BATTALION.

Jacob lived in WEST JAVA for a decade (1977—1987), completing high school, then a Bachelor of Arts (1982) and *Doctorandus* (Masters) in Geography (1987) at the Institute for Teachers Training and Educational Sciences (IKIP) in Bandung. His tudies and experiments with NON-VIOLENCE inspired the generation of Indonesians who brought down President Suharto in 1998.

In 1987 he was teaching at the Indonesian National Scientific Institute, and working at the Physical Geography Research Institute for East Indonesia as well ad the Environment Resource Institute of Indonesia, when the Indonesian government appointed him head of the Physical Science Department at Cenderawasih University in JAYAPURA (West Papua).

At CENDERAWASIH UNIVERSITY, Jacob taught Papuan intellectuals, students, and former political prisoners NON-VIOLENCE in accordance with NEW TESTAMENT principles and the cultural-political persuasions of the WEST MELANESIA COUNCIL (fore-runner of the West Papua National Authority and the declaratory Federal Republic of West Papua).

In 1989, he was charged with subversion with a life sentence; incarcerated in eight military and four civilian prisons, then TANGERANG PRISON at the top of a thirty-foot stone tower, and finally CIPINANG PRISON alongside Xanana Gusmao. (He described Cipinang in Xanana's autobiography as a 'first-class Indonesian jail'). In 1999, he escaped to EAST TIMOR to report on the referendum for Xanana, and from there was flown to Australia on a RAAF Hercules with Bishop Belo. He accepted Australian citizenship in 2006.

Jacob was part of West Papua's delegation to the PACIFIC ISLANDS FORUM in Fiji (2002), New Zealand (2003), Fiji (2006), PNG (2015); and the MELANESIAN SPEARHEAD GROUP in PNG (2005), Kanaky (2013), Solomon Islands (2015). In 2006 he met the UN SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON DECOLONIZATION in Fiji. In 2007, he signed the ground-breaking UNITARY DAY PORT VILA DECLARATION with the Maraki Vanuariki Council of Chiefs and Port Vila Council of Chiefs.

In 2003 he was in the West Papua delegation to the EUROPEAN UNION in Brussels. In 2004 he presented to JAPAN'S FOREIGN AFFAIRS Department in Tokyo. In 2006 he attended the International Solidarity Movement meeting in CANADA, and organized the first MELANESIAN Cultural Festival in HOLLAND.

In 2011, Jacob was appointed Minister of Foreign Affairs in the FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF WEST PAPUA, and in 2012 he participated in executive-level talks in Jakarta with Indonesian President Yudhoyono.

In December 2014, during the Reconciliation and Unity Summit for West Papuan Leaders in Vanuatu, Jacob was elected an Executive Officer of the UNITED LIBERATION MOVEMENT FOR WEST PAPUA, the committee charged with drafting and presenting West Papua's (successful) application to join the Melanesian Spearhead Group and Pacific Islands Forum.
